These events represent the tip of the iceberg of unethical business practices that have sparked growing concerns from researchers, governments, practitioners, and civil society (Brown & Treviño, 2014; Manz, Anand, Joshi, & Manz, 2008; Mehta, 2003; Treviño et al., 2014).

Organizations have witnessed people's unethical behaviour, especially those who seek to satisfy their personal and self-interest goals. Often, such ego-centric behaviours are at the expense and pain of the greater good, that is, causing grave impairment to the organization's internal and external stakeholders (Padilla, Hogan, & Kaiser, 2007; Schaubroeck, Walumbwa, Ganster, & Kepes, 2007). As a result, in an era of unprecedented change in which human and technological systems have become increasingly interconnected and transformed at an unprecedented rate, and where human vulnerabilities to ecological and planetary dynamics are becoming more apparent, the concept of successful organizational change must be reassessed to include the need for significant and simultaneous change in multiple institutions and organizations in the direction of greater sustainability. (2015) (Waddock, Meszoely, Waddell, & Dentoni). According to Schein (2010), ethics is the critical examination of the assumptions that emerge and are taught to members of an organization.

Leaders must position themselves as ethical role models to create a successful work environment over time (Grojean, Resick, Dickson, & Smith, 2004; Trevio et al., 2014). To offer a moral framework, they must model the highest moral behaviour via their actions. Most study on ethical conduct emphasizes the importance of ethics for leaders (Harris, 1990; Mayer, Kuenzi, Greenbaum, Bardes, & Salvador, 2009). As a result, ethical leaders play an essential role in influencing and affecting

workers' ethical behaviour at work by actively engaging in ethical standards (Brown & Trevio, 2006; De Hoogh & Den Hartog, 2008; Mitchell, Reynolds, & Trevio, 2017; Wiernik & Ones, 2018; Ko et al., 2018).

Leadership theories try to describe the skills and behaviours that allow leaders to succeed (IET, 2023). They research well-known leaders, such as presidents and company entrepreneurs, to better understand why certain professionals make better leaders than others. Leadership theories are important because they explain the tactics and mental processes that must be learned to become a better leader. This is crucial to the health and well-being of an organization. As a leader, you must assume responsibility for your actions and decisions since they may benefit or hurt your organization. As a consequence, leadership theories can help you make better choices. Your efforts can have a big impact on the productivity and motivation of your employees.

**Step 3: Refreeze.** This simply means solidifying the desired change you intend to bring to the organization.

In line with Kurt Lewin's Power Field theory, controlling variables influence the way of behaving of people, eventually decide the destiny of change. Employees are spurred and directed toward the future state by the driving elements. The limiting elements accentuate conceivable resistance to change and act as essential hindrances to change exercises.

Recent research (e.g. Wang and Sung, 2016; Yang, Ding, and Lo, 2016) has shown that this leadership style is positively related to organizational behaviours (OBs), which are extra-role activities that extend beyond the core task requirements and result in beneficial outcomes for the organization (Bolino, Turnley, and Bloodgood, 2002). Ethics is a determining factor for the success of leadership. In an organization, leadership is considered good if the leadership functions are carried out based on ethical principles according to the values adopted by the organization. Ethical leadership will create a more comfortable working atmosphere in the organization, higher productivity, and resolve conflicts that exist within the organization (Pasricha et al., 2022).

Companies such as Arthur Andersen, WorldCom, Rite Aid, and others, have tarnished or damaged their reputation due to the corruption committed by their leaders (Jansen, 2021). Likewise, companies and organizations in the UK and European countries are widely discussed regarding issues of bribery and corruption (Robbie & Praharjo, 2020). The same concern is felt very strongly among the people. In the United States, these scandals involve business people. In Nigeria, the parties involved are various elements, ranging from business people to state administrators, both the executive, legislative, and judiciary.

The 2021 Corruption Perception Index released by Transparency International, states that Nigeria scored 29 out of 100 points, and is ranked 168 out of a total of 180 countries (Pinintasih & Salendu, 2022). The Corruption Perception Index is a survey regarding perceptions of corruption that occurs in a country according to public opinion. These results indicate that opinion regarding the occurrence of corruption, especially in Nigeria, is still relatively high when compared to other countries. This then raises many questions, why can this happen?
